

## 11+ Assessment Test - English

## 50 minutes. Total 50 marks.

Excerpt from Gulliver's Travels – chapter 2.

Gulliver arrives in a country where he finds himself to be a giant in his surroundings.

- 1. When I found myself on my feet, I looked about me, and must confess I never beheld a more entertaining prospect. The country around appeared like a continued garden, and the enclosed fields, which were generally forty feet square, resembled so many beds of flowers. These fields were intermingled with woods, and the tallest trees appeared to be seven feet high. I viewed the town on my left hand, which looked like the painted scenes of a city in a theatre.
- 2. I soon came out of my house, having occasion for fresh air. The emperor was already descended from the tower, and advancing on horseback towards me, which would cost him dear; for the beast, though very well trained, yet wholly unused to such a sight, which appeared as if a mountain moved before him, reared up on his hind feet. Being an excellent horseman, his majesty kept his seat till his attendants ran in and held the bridle, while he had time to dismount.
- 3. When he alighted, he surveyed me round with great admiration, but kept beyond the length of my chain. He ordered his cooks and butlers, who were already prepared, to give me victuals and drink, which they pushed forward in a sort of vehicle upon wheels, till I could reach them. I took these vehicles and emptied them all: twenty of them were filled with meat, and ten with liquor.
- 4. His imperial majesty spoke often to me, and I returned answers, but neither of us could understand a syllable. I spoke to them in as many languages as I had the least smattering of, but all to no purpose.
- 5. After about two hours the court retired and I was left with a strong guard, to prevent the impertinence, and probably the malice, of the rabble, who were very impatient to crowd about me as near as they dared; and some of them had the impudence to shoot their arrows at me, as I sat on the ground by the door of my house, whereof one very narrowly missed my left eye.
- 6. But the colonel ordered the ringleaders to be seized and delivered them bound into my hands. I took them all in my right hand, put five of them into my coat pocket, and as to the sixth, I made a countenance as if I would eat him alive. The poor man squalled terribly, and the colonel and his officers were in much pain, especially when they saw me take out my pen-knife. But I soon put them out of fear, for, looking mildly and immediately cutting the strings he was bound with, I set him gently on the ground, and away he ran.
